USING EBSCO FOR RESEARCH ESSAY

The Essays: YouThroughout the year, you will be writing short collegiate level, MLA format, researchbased informative essays in which you inform or persuade your reader on a variety of topics.

Evidence: You will need to include evidence to support your claim from two different sources: <u>Brave New</u> <u>World</u> and an outside article from EBSCO.

WHAT IS EBSCO?

If you are my returning student, you are already familiar with EBSCO. If this is brand new to you, EBSCO is on online database of scholary articles that have been vetted for credibility and made available for students pursuing higher learning.

HOW TO USE EBSCO:

First, type the following website in the URL spot: http://search.ebscohost.com/

USER ID: centinela PASSWORD: library

*You will need to type in the user id and password when you use this website outside of school.

- 1.) Click on EBSCOhost Research Databases
- 2.) Hit **Continue** on the next page
- 3.) On the search page, type in your proposed health topic like "diabetes in American teens" or "the dangers of sugary foods"
- 4.) On the left task bar, check the box that says Scholarly (Peer Reviewed) Articles

HOW TO CITE:

Once you have to article open that you want to cite, click on the little page on the right task bar. When you hover your mouse across it, the words **Cite** will pop up. Then you click on it, and scroll down to MLA Format. Then copy/paste the citation at add it to the bottom of your answer.

BRAVE NEW WORLD ESSAYS:

1.) For the next three weeks, you will be writing a 2-3 page research paper for the following topics related to the book. Once you score a 46 or higher, you will not have to write the remaining essays. You may rewrite the essays for a higher grade, but the higher grade will not excuse you from writing the next essay.

OKAY. LET'S FIND A QUOTE TOGETHER.

- 1.) Open up search.ebscohost.com
- 2.) Click on EBSCOhost Research Databases
- 3.) Type in "eugenics" in search bar
- 4.) On left side, check the box that says "scholarly peer reviewed articles"
- 5.) Adjust the search in the search bar and write "eugenics and brave new world"
- 6.) Click on number one: "Community, Identity, and Stablity"
- 7.) Click on PDF full next

Okay, maybe we write a thesis about how eugenics can be good for helping cure diseases, improve ability, etc, but we want to warn against science going too far. Here's a quote that I could use in my essay.

"Perceived at the time as a science, eugenics is interested in the genetic improvement of the human species through such practices as selective breeding, birth control, and sterilization. The eugenics movement called for greater control of the state over its people; by improving its "human stock," each state could expect, eugenicists argued, to be strengthened" (Congdon 84).

*Pay attention to how I used the author's last name and page number. That's how you cite in MLA Format. *Now, when I go to use this quote in my essay, I can cite just sections of it; I don't have to cite the whole chunk.

How do I cite an article that has already been cited in another article?

Sometimes an author of a book, article or website will mention another person's work by using a quotation or paraphrased idea from that source. (This may be called a secondary source.) For example, the Congdon article you are reading includes several quotes from other authors. Let me show you how to cite an quote within a quote.

THIS IS WHAT IT LOOKS LIKE IN THE TEXT:

Woiak's conclusion is that Brave New World "offers a sophisticated critique of how scientific knowledge emerges from and in turn serves the social, political, and economic agendas of those in power" (Woiak 124).

THIS IS HOW I WOULD QUOTE IT:

According to Robert S. Baker, David Bradshaw, and Joanne Woiak (qtd. in Congdon) the Brave New World World "offers a sophisticated critique of how scientific knowledge emerges from and in turn serves the social, political, and economic agendas of those in power" (84).

Now, when you use research, you must cite your sources internally (within the body of the essay) and create a MLA Citation at the end.

MLA CITATION AT END:

- **1.)** On the right side of the pdf, you'll see a bunch of icons.
- 2.) Click on the one that says "cite" when you hover above it with your mouse or trackpad.
- 3.) Scroll through the list until you find th article cited in MLA format.
- 4.) Copy/paste at the end of your essay.

That's what your entry should look like. I had to put the cursor at the end of the line and hit enter to get the second and third lines to indent. I also cut the lon URL and substituted "Online. Accessed 14 Oct. 2018."

Now that you know how to pull a fact from EBSCO, you are all ready to write an essay!

HERE ARE THE REQUIREMENTS:

- 1.) Introduce the issue of eugenics, mentioning postitives and negatives. Use BNW as a cautionary tale against using technology to govern humanity.
- 2.) Make a claim.
- 3.) Support it with with two pieces of evidence: BNW and an outside article.
- 4.) Include a Works Cited section at the end of your essay with the 2 pieces of evidence.
